A reading from Acts of the Apostles (12.1-11)

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw

that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

A reading from St. Matthew's Gospel (16.13-19)

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

Today we commemorate Peter, Patron Saint of our church in Snailwell and, along with St Mary Magdalene, Patron Saint of our church in Fordham.

For many Christians St Peter is the most well-known and well-loved disciple of all. You may, at some time, like to see how many facts about his life and his relationship with Jesus you can remember from key passages in the Gospels and the Book of Acts, such as the time beside the Sea of Galilee when Jesus called

Simon (as he was first known) and his brother Andrew, to follow him. (Mark 1:16-17) Or his witnessing Jesus walking on water and his eagerness to do the same before fear and doubt overcame him. (Matthew 14: 22-31)

Today's Gospel is another of those 'key' passages in Peter's life, sometimes referred to as 'the great confession of Peter'. The moment when Jesus asks of his disciples. 'Who do you say that I am?

Imagine being faced with that question! I can picture the disciples grappling with this, agog, lost for words, needing time to reflect, for how could they begin to explain this incredible person? They have witnessed his remarkable teaching and audacious crossing of social and religious barriers to connect with foreigners, tax collectors and women and men of low status, They have been witness to miraculous physical healings and healings of the mind; his stilling of the storm; walking on water; his blessing of a few morsels of food to feed 5,000 + folk., hungry for his word as well as for food. They have heard other folk describe Jesus as 'John the Baptist, 'Elijah', 'Jeremiah' or 'One of the prophets' but now Jesus is asking them directly,

'Who do you say that I am?'

and what follows for Peter is a 'eureka' moment; a flash of truly divine inspiration that causes him to boldly declare,

'You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God!'

Peter must have felt elation at that point, and yes, there is no doubt that he answered well; for it had dawned on him that Jesus was more than a Rabbi, more than a prophet. Here was the long-promised Messiah of God, the Anointed one, the Chosen one, the one who would bring justice and deliver God's people from oppression. And Jesus responds,

'Blessed are you, Simon, son of Jonah, For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it' Peter's passionate, heartfelt, confident response is inspiring, but it was only much later, in the context of a very long, arduous and painful journey, the way of a learner, 'a path of both grace and sin', to quote Pope Francis, that Peter came to fully understand the answer he gave. For his journey would take him from the certainty of that day of declaration to the despair of that fateful night of denial when, at The Last Supper Jesus predicted of Peter:

'This very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times', Peter, affronted and shocked, affirmed his allegiance,

'Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you'.

Yet in the terror and fear of that same night, after thrice denying his Lord, heard the cock crow and remembered, and wept bitterly. (Matthew 26: 31-75)

Imagine the lingering guilt and shame and disillusionment that he would carry through the horrors of the crucifixion and which, no doubt, would continue to weigh heavily beneath those mixed and heady emotions of elation and excitement and bewilderment on the day of resurrection. The weight of remorse and inner turmoil that he would, surely, still have felt even when Jesus, still bearing the wounds of crucifixion, appeared amongst his disciples and uttered 'Peace be with you'...

'Who do you say that I am?'

'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

I wonder if that momentous exchange came back to Peter's mind when he and a small group of disciples witnessed another post-resurrection appearance of Jesus, this time by the Sea of Galilee? (John 21: 1-19). For it was there, by the waters where Jesus had first summoned Peter, that he took him to one side and three times asked of Peter the searching question,

'Simon, Son of John, do you love me?'

After all that had happened along the way, it must have been difficult for Peter to pluck up the courage to lift his head and meet the steady gaze of the One who asked this of him, but in doing so, in facing Jesus eye to eye, heart to heart, and in each utterance,

'Yes Lord, you know I do',

Peter came to fully understand the answer he had given at the very start of his journey with Jesus. Here was the Messiah, the Son of the Living God, sent to deliver God's people not through might and power, but through compassion and understanding and mercy. Here was the Messiah, the Son of the Living God, who knew Peter's many faults and failings - and yet, and yet!! still loved him utterly, completely, unconditionally. Here was the Messiah, the Son of the living God willing not only to forgive him, but to reinstate and reaffirm him as the rock upon which the church would be built.

Jesus' companions would later, at the Feast of Pentecost, open their hearts and minds to the transforming work of the promised Holy Spirit. It was then that Peter, full of all he had learnt from the life and example of his Lord, found himself emboldened to preach and proclaim and live out the Gospel of love and hope and redemption in a remarkable way which he followed to the very end.

Pope Francis described Peter's faith journey as 'A path of both grace and sin'. And that is why, through the ages, so many have found they can relate to him, and why, in our present times of turmoil and uncertainty his faith story resonates with our own. At times so sure; at other times uncertain. At times truly inspired and enlightened, yet at others confused & bewildered. Full of good intentions one minute and failing the next. Believing yet doubting. At times full of courage and

hope, at others, full of fear. But above all, Peter's story inspires us as one of true discipleship; of the willingness to learn. Of having the honesty to own one's failings and fears and mistakes, and the humility to learn from them. Of opening oneself to new ways of thinking and new patterns of life. Of striving to walk with Jesus and to be open to the transforming work of the Spirit in every area of one's life. Of showing faith through care and service and acts of compassion and love. Of keeping the faith; of not giving up, even when the going gets tough and doubt and despair loom large. Of being reassured of God's amazing grace even when, in times of isolation, guilt and shame and remorse and unworthiness may weigh heavy upon the heart. Of finding time to sit at Jesus' feet; simply to be in his presence; to draw close and allow his love to enfold and surround. To feel utterly safe and secure in His love whatever life brings, so that we, like Peter, can truly declare,

'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

And we, too, may continue to 'Grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord' (2 Peter 3:18), faithful to the very end.
