Dear friends, we have come together on this day to commemorate the 75th anniversary of Victory in Europe, when the sounds of war fell silent on this continent.

The bible is a rich treasury of all sorts of different texts and the text from Micah which we have heard today is a reasonably common archetype. A vision of a more perfect future. A promise of a perfect world in the full presence of God. A time when everyone comes together in unity to worship God, where war will come to and end and we can all live in a time of peace. A good reading to think about as we mark 75 years since the cessation of hostilities in Europe in the second world war.

In his announcement to the nation, on that first VE day, Churchill noted that "We may allow ourselves a brief period of rejoicing; but let us not forget for a moment the toil and efforts that lie ahead." Days of celebration like today will always be days like that, giving thanks for something good, whilst acknowledging that there is always more to be done. Churchill knew that the was still plenty of work to be done in the far east, still many service personnel putting themselves in danger, but that the time was right for a celebration to boost morale and to congratulate those who had defeated the might of fascism in Europe.

Thinking about the celebrations surrounding Captain Tom Moore's 100th birthday felt a bit like that. He has brought a welcome respite from the gloomy news which seems to be everywhere we turn. He has shown a wonderful example of fortitude and reminded us of the best that his generation offered.

The large amount of money he has raised (just under £33 million when the justgiving page was closed to new donations) shows the appreciation we have for all those who work in health services, alongside those other essential workers who keep us fed, watered, healed, connected, heated, clean, taught and cared for.

We have our weekly appointment at the end of drives to show our appreciation for all those who continue to work on the "front line". These moments of celebration even joy are about celebrating all that is good, in the knowledge that we are still a way off returning to normal.

We are still in the midst of lockdown, waiting for the scientists to find a vaccine, for ways of living which will prevent further peaks and minimise further spreading.

At the heart of Christian faith is the now and not yet. The promise of heaven, the promise of dwelling place within the house of the Lord. We acknowledge that the world is not yet that perfect place but we are called to make the world more perfect. By doing all we can to prevent conflict and working to build peace, by caring for our neighbours in times of need, by bringing joy into the world. All these small acts in the now, help us towards becoming the place that is not yet, that place which we might call heaven, the dwelling place of the most high, the God whom we adore.

We are probably still a long way from turning all the spears into pruning hooks, swords into ploughshares, upcycling Kalashnikovs into furniture, turning jet fighters into humanitarian transport. VE day gives us hope that we can bring conflicts to an end and work to build a lasting peace between the nations. That we might all be able to sit at table together, sharing in the fruit of the vine and grains of the earth.

We pray too for the small celebrations on the way as we go through our current crisis, thanking those who are risking their lives by staying safe at home to halt the spread.

For peacemakers and peacekeepers, who seek to keep this world secure and free; may God give peace. God give peace. For all who bear the burden and privilege of leadership, political, military and religious; asking for gifts of wisdom and resolve in the search for reconciliation and peace; may God give peace. God give peace.

O God of truth and justice, we hold before you those whose memory we cherish, and those whose names we will never know. Help us to lift our eyes above the torment of this broken world, and grant us the grace to pray for those who wish us harm. As we honour the past, may we put our faith in your future; for you are the source of life and hope, now and for ever. Amen.
